

# **Celebrating Our Centenary**

**Getting students hammered for 100 Years** 

It is with great pleasure that our committee will preside over our Society's centenary this year. That's right our centenary! The Sydney University Veterinary Society (better known as VetSoc) was formed in 1912, presided by none other than J.D. Stewart himself – the founder of the Faculty of Veterinary Science at the University of Sydney. For the first eight years of its activities, the Society was presided over by a member of staff, alternating between Professor J.D. Stewart and Dr. S. Dodd. In 1920, however, the administration of the Society was completely transferred to the student body with then student Dr. I. Clunies Ross elected as the first student president of the Society, making the Sydney University Veterinary Society the second oldest student-run society on campus and only preceded by the University of Sydney Union itself.

# **Lizard of the Quarter**

In case you haven't had Glenn lecturing in a while

A **Southern Spinifex Delma**, *Delma butleri*, from near Coombah, south of Broken Hill.

This is one of the pygopod lizards, a uniquely Australian family of gecko




relatives that have evolved an elongate body with limb reduction. Despite the general similarity in appearance to snakes, they are unrelated to them, and are easily distinguished from snakes by possessing an external ear opening (absent in snakes), a thick fleshy tongue (not a slender forked snake tongue), paired scales along the belly (rather than a single row of broad scales), a relatively short body and long tail (the junction of body and tail on this one is marked by the hind limb flaps, which can be seen just adjacent to where the tip of the tail crosses the lizard's body – snakes have a long body and a very short tail), and the ability to autotomise and regenerate the tail (this individual has a regenerated tail, marked by the abrupt change in scale arrangement about half-way along the last coil at the rear of the photo). Like their gecko ancestors, pygopods are completely non-venomous.

This species is one of a number of Australian lizards that inhabit spinifex (Triodia) tussocks in arid Australia, sheltering among the dense network of spines, and hunting insects in the clumps. If pursued outside the clumps, they leap into the air by suddenly straightening themselves from a partly coiled or wriggling position in the hope of escaping predators. This particular species also has the unusual ability to rapidly change its belly colour from bright yellow to pure white.
